

Dec. 1961 - The Re-Sale Shop opened at 928 South 10th Street, staffed by League volunteers. The used and nearly new clothing sold on a 40/60 percentage basis, with 40% of the profit going towards League's charitable activities and 60% going to the owners.

Apr. 1963 - After 33 years of service, the Well Baby Clinic closed its doors. The Visiting Nurse Service moved to a new location on York Street. The Health Center building was sold and moved to a new site.

Apr. 1967 - League organized and sponsored the first pre-school vision screen program in Manitowoc County. The service was free and available to all children between the ages of 4 and 6. \$500 was donated to the new Manitowoc Public Library for the purchase of the "Flame of Knowledge" metal sculpture. League offered to serve as a nucleus in helping to develop the cultural influence of the Rahr Civic Center and Museum.

1968 - Tours began of the pioneer cabin (room) within the Rahr Civic Center and Museum. Fourth graders saw an interior of a cabin and sampled refreshments commonly served in pioneer times.

Dec. 1969 - Under the direction of League, residents of Manitowoc County Hospitals were asked to make Christmas presents for children in special education classes. "Operation Candy Cane" gave the residents a sense of purpose and "the joy that comes from helping others." The children then gave a party to thank them.

Feb. 28, 1969 - \$700 was donated to the Joseph Mann Two Rivers Library to purchase equipment for the newly enlarged children's area.

1970 - Approximately 100 framed fine art reproductions were donated to the Manitowoc Public Library for circulation in Manitowoc County.
